Connecticut	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Lodging for leisure, vacation and other nonessential purposes are prohibited. 		
Delaware	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> All short-term rentals in the state are banned through May 15, with the exception of rentals to certain groups, including health care providers, journalists, those with public housing vouchers and victims of domestic violence.

Florida	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Those offering vacation rentals are prohibited from taking on new reservations and from accepting new guests, in most cases. Hotels, motels, inns, time-shares and resorts are exempt. 		
Georgia	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> New short-term vacation rentals are suspended from April 9 through April 30; this does not apply to hotels, motels, extended-stay lodging or campgrounds.

Idaho		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Blaine County, has banned hotel and short-term rentals to those from outside the county unless they are performing essential functions.

Indiana	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Hotels and motels remain open only for lodging and food delivery or carryout.

Maine	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> All lodging operations, including hotels, motels, bed-and-breakfasts, inns, Airbnb rentals, R.V. parks and campgrounds have been suspended, except for those serving vulnerable populations. 		
Maryland		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Ocean City, Maryland is restricting short term accommodations for hotels and rentals to essential lodgers only through April 30, 2020. To see the full list of essential lodgers, view the March 31 declaration here. 	
Massachusetts	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Lodging for leisure or vacation is prohibited, but it is allowed when necessary for an essential service.

West Virginia		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Berkley County announced on April 4 that it is limiting grocery stores to allow 2 shoppers per 1,000 square feet and 2.5 customers per 1,000 square feet for other businesses deemed essential. County officials have also directed hotels, motels and Airbnbs to require a minimum stay of 14 days. Healthcare workers would be allowed to stay upon request.
