

COIVD-19 Update: Notable International Mentions

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The border between Canada and the U.S. is set to remain closed to all non-essential travel until at least August 21. 	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The EU has revealed a list of 14 countries whose citizens will be allowed to visit the bloc from July 1, but the United States, China and Brazil have been left off. The list includes Australia, Canada, Japan, Morocco and South Korea. The EU has suggested it will add China once the Chinese government offers a reciprocal deal for EU travelers. 	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau announced on May 19 that non-essential travel between the United States and Canada will be restricted for another 30 days. The Trump Administration has already placed restrictions on non-essential travel to Canada and Mexico, and an order to indefinitely suspend travel is currently under review. 	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The United States and Canada have agreed to extend the border closure for non-essential travel by 30 days, until May 20. 	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The 2020 Summer Olympics is officially postponed until 2021 due to COVID-19. 	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Wimbledon has been canceled for the first time since World War II. 	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • On March 20, President Trump announced that the U.S.-Mexico border will be closed to non-essential travel. This will not include trade. 	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The United States and Canada have mutually closed their borders. This does not apply to commerce/supply chain. As of March 16, the United Kingdom and Ireland joined the list of countries in Europe from which travel will be restricted.
