Checks have been issued to all applicants who were approved on or before September 4. Applications approved after that date through October 20, when the process was closed, are in queue for payment. "We ask those people who already applied to please be patient. At the end of process, we will approve 5,000 applications for a total of \$5 million," said Health and Human Services Director Joyce Bishop. "It is a complicated process with several layers of review for checks and balance, and it's been slow going as we have received many duplicate applications and multiple applications from a single household." Please do not reapply. Residents with problematic applications will be notified by email from CaresIAGrant@flaglercounty.org. "We understand that people are anxious to get their money, but we are asking you to trust the process," Bishop said. "Submitting repeat applications and requests for status updates slows the process down for everyone." New applicants ONLY should apply online at http://www.flaglercounty.org/departments/social_services/CARES_Individual_Assistance.php Applicants will be required to provide at the time of their appointment the following: a Florida driver's license or a state-issued photo identification, and ALL of the bills being claimed - not just the last bill with the total amount due. Paper copies of the bills are required. "If you are submitting your lease as proof of your rent, please be sure that the lease is current, the address is correct, and that it is signed by all parties," Bishop said. "If you are missing documents, or have incomplete documents, you will have to reschedule your appointment. There is a limited amount of funding available so it is important that you bring everything with you." Interview appointments continue to be held at 1000 Belle Terre Boulevard (not Parkway), Palm Coast, which is just south of the Tractor Supply Company store. Follow the signs to the entrance of the brick David I. Siegel Adult Day Care building. This funding is being awarded as part of the fourth round of the new \$36 million Food Security Infrastructure Grant Program, created following recommendations from the Administration's COVID-19 Command Center's Food Security Task Force, which promotes ongoing efforts to ensure that individuals and families throughout the Commonwealth have access to healthy, local food. "As part of our response to the COVID-19 pandemic, we continue to build on our efforts to secure a resilient, diverse local food supply chain so Massachusetts residents maintain access to fresh, healthy food," said Governor Charlie Baker. "With this fourth round of grants, we will have awarded a total of \$17.7 million, making critical investments in our local food infrastructure and ensuring a secure supply of food as residents across the Commonwealth adjust to the impacts of this unprecedented public health challenge." "Families throughout Massachusetts, especially those living in underserved communities, will continue to receive better access to healthy, local food through the investments made through this important program," said Lt. Governor Karyn Polito. "These projects will ensure a strong, resilient supply of local food while delivering health and economic benefits to communities across the Commonwealth." The goal of the Food Security Infrastructure Grant Program is to ensure that individuals and families throughout the Commonwealth have equitable access to food, especially local food. The program also seeks to ensure that farmers, fishermen and other local food producers are better connected to a strong, resilient food system to help mitigate future food supply and distribution disruption. The fourth round of the grant program includes 47 awards for a total of \$5,895,554 to fund critical investments in technology, equipment, capacity, and other assistance to help local food producers, especially in the distribution of food insecure communities. When evaluating the applications, considerations included equity, economic impact and need, sustainability and scalability of efforts, and ability to support producer readiness to accept SNAP and HIP benefits. In the program's first three rounds, the Administration awarded over \$11.7 to more than 90 recipients. "Food insecurity remains a significant challenge for families throughout the Commonwealth during the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic," said Energy and Environmental Affairs Secretary Kathleen Theoharides. "These projects address critical gaps within Massachusetts' local food system, and this significant investment will help our local farmers, fishermen, food banks, and distribution networks continue their essential work producing a steady supply of healthy, nutritious food to communities and underserved neighborhoods." "The continued work of the Food Security Task Force under the COVID-19 Command Center has built out the food security infrastructure in the Commonwealth, connecting families and individuals with critical food resources during the pandemic," said COVID-19 Response Command Center Director and Secretary of Health and Human Services Marylou Sudders. "This round of grants supports local organizations that help meet Massachusetts' residents needs where they are, including supporting organizations that participate in existing nutrition programs like SNAP and WIC that help residents with limited income access healthy food." Eligible grantees include entities that are part of the Massachusetts local food system including production, processing and distribution, the emergency food distribution network, Buy Local, community and food organizations, school meal programming, urban farms and community gardens, non-profits, and organizations that provide business planning, technical assistance and information technology services. The Request for Responses for project proposals closed on September 15, 2020. Applications submitted before the proposal deadline will continue to be evaluated for future rounds of funding. The new case involves a part-time resident of Warren County who tested positive after traveling to another state, and chose to isolate while at their family home in Warren County. With several recent new Warren County COVID cases appearing to stem from interstate travel and COVID case numbers increasing around the country, Warren County Health Services Director Ginelle Jones strongly urges the public to avoid non-essential travel as well as gatherings of any sort at this point of the pandemic. Several recent COVID-19 cases have also involved Warren County residents who appear to have been exposed while traveling with others in vehicles. Travel in vehicles with people who aren't from your household is discouraged unless necessary for work purposes, and mask/face covering precautions should be taken when in vehicles with those who aren't from your household. Health Services staff direct that those who feel any symptom of illness should refrain from attending school, work or going into public until they consult with a medical provider to discuss a COVID-19 test. Mask use, hand washing and social distancing are particularly important during this period of time as we look to keep our schools open and COVID-free. Also: * Warren County Board of Elections and Warren County Health Services have been working together to ensure those who are quarantined because of possible COVID-19 exposures will be able to vote this fall. There have been two new probable cases in the past 24 hours. Probable cases refer to those that have supporting epidemiological and clinical evidence that a COVID-19 infection has occurred, regardless of test result. If a person is a close contact of a COVID-19 case and has a clinically compatible illness, he or she can meet the criteria to be a probable case. Additionally, a positive result of an antigen test from a respiratory specimen can meet the criteria to be a probable case. If a health care provider diagnoses a person with clinically compatible illness with COVID-19, this person meets the probable case criteria. Including both confirmed and probable cases, MPHD officials announced a total of 34,156 cases, an increase of 199 in the past 24 hours. The cases range in age from 1 month to 103 years. There have been no new probable deaths reported in the past 24 hours. When the health care provider who signs the death certificate determines COVID-19 disease was the cause of death or a significant condition contributing to death, this person meets the probable case criteria and would be considered a probable death. An additional confirmed death has been reported in the past 24 hours, a 64-year-old woman with underlying health conditions.
